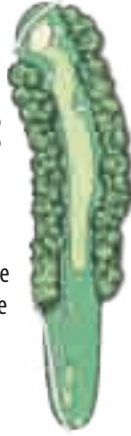


It's not easy to shoot a 59 on the PGA Tour – only four golfers have ever done it competitively – but with its spongy greens and short par 4s, Sedgefield Country Club just might be the place to do it. Staff writer Robert Bell tells you how:

No. 3:
174 yards
Keep the ball below the hole and to the right on this heavily-sloped green.



No. 5:
529 yards
Sedgefield's easiest hole — but you have to find a level lie in the rippling fairway.



No. 8:
374 yards
The shortest par-4 on the course. Some might try to drive the green with a front pin placement.



No. 13:
405 yards
Hug the right side of the fairway to keep your ball from leaking into the rough. Then attack the pin.



No. 16:
163 yards
Now the pressure's mounting. You need to stick your tee shot for birdie.

No. 2:
442 yards

Golfers can attack a pin placement on the left side of the green without having to worry about the creek hugging the right.



No. 4:
428 yards

The key here's the drive. Keep it to the left for the most favorable line into the green.



No. 6:
423 yards

A drive slightly left of center affords an easy short-iron in.



No. 9:
416 yards

Another short par 4. A birdie at the turn and you're on your way.



No. 15:
572 yards

Most golfers will go for the green in two so even an eagle is possible.



No. 17:
406 yards

Keep to the left on your drive and be careful with the approach into Sedgefield's smallest green.
